## Evidence, Not Politics, Should Guide Cancer Care

I would like to thank the editor for her thoughtful editorial "Mammography and the Media" (vol. 14, p. 125). As oncology nurses, we are committed to advocating for all patients with cancer. As the author noted, we are supposed to be using evidence-based practice to drive the care we deliver. The updated guidelines were scientifically based and critiqued. ## **ONS Journals Are Environmentally Friendly**



The Oncology Nursing Society (ONS) takes care to minimize the impact of its publications on the environment.

- The Clinical Journal of Oncology Nursing (CJON) and Oncology Nursing Forum (ONF) are printed on 30% postconsumer recycled paper.
- The inks used to print the journals are SoySeal certified by the American Soybean Association. Soy ink is lower in volatile organic compounds (VOCs), making it less toxic during printing.
- The plastic bag that *CJON* and *ONF* are mailed in is recyclable. ONS uses the clear "polybag" to save significant postage costs. The polybag is type 4—LDPE—which is the type of plastic used for many shopping bags. Check your local chain grocery store for bins where you can drop polybags and shopping bags to be recycled.
- The printer of both journals recycles more than 50 million pounds of paper and paper products each year.
